40th AGA in Cape Town, South Africa 16. – 21. September 2007

Nearly 300 delegates and observers, representing Airline Clubs worldwide, met from 16 - 21 September at the Lagoon Beach Hotel in Cape Town, South Africa, at the 40th Annual General Assembly of the WORLD AIRLINES CLUBS ASSOCIATION (WACA). During the event, the Association celebrated the 40th Anniversary of its foundation. For the first time in its history, an Annual General Assembly was organized by one of the Regions – Regional Vice President Mr. Yousef Yousef and his Committee from the Africa, Indian Ocean Islands and Middle East Region invested a great deal of effort in carefully planning all the details of this event.

In his welcome speech, WACA's President Mr. Maga Ramasamy stated, that the 40th Assembly was to be held with the theme of translating compassion into action. WACA will contribute to the efforts to combat HIV+/AIDS in South Africa and to the UN Millennium Development Goal No. 6 by supporting FIKELELA, a non-profit organization that provides an active response to the HIV+/AIDS pandemic in South Africa. Canon Reverend Rachel Mash, founder and coordinator of FIKELELA, opened the Assembly. This Assembly marks a milestone in the history of WACA, where a long-term Charity project has being identified. In collaboration with FIKELELA, all WACA donations will be channeled through the WACA Relief Fund and will be used to assist needy children regrouping under FIKELELA.

At the start of the working sessions, WACA's President Maga Ramasamy introduced two new Members of Honour of the Association, **Mr. Ratnasabapathy Sivanandam**, Airline Club of Singapore and **Mr. Kurt Zimmermann**, Interairline Club Zürich. 40th AGA in Cape Town, South Africa (3)

It was decided before the Regional Meetings began that we would have a Pre Meeting with the WACA Executive Committee to see if we could have an open discussion between all clubs to see just how we could better WACA. Today we have around half the clubs left that started 40 years ago. WACA had 97 clubs, and down to 54 - 56 clubs, perhaps even less. It was a brainstorming session, to try and get all of the clubs thinking about ways to improve the packages and communications. It was decided that each delegate should go back to their home clubs and take a 10 minute survey on what each club is doing to try and help the three big questions

- 1) Communication
- 2) Coordination
- 3) Cooperation

I would like to see YVR come up with a plan and perhaps some new ideas.

North American Regional Meeting

Out of 15 clubs in North America, we had 11 delegates attend. That is a fantastic amount. All member clubs still active in North America are paid up. The minutes from Shanghai and San Diego were approved.

The North American Eric Moilliet fund, Montreal Interline Club had a balance in the account of \$624.91 Cdn. It was approved by the delegates to accept Chico Valdez's, Montreal Interline Club offer to donate \$200.00 to Mother Rochelle's Orphanage from this fund. It was unanimously approved by the delegates. Sharon Revel, alternate delegate from Vancouver wanted to put through a motion that perhaps all interliners could put together some sort of plan to offer home stay to interliners travelling to various places a home to stay at with the member at home of course. It was decided that we needed to work on this, you need some kind of a form of control to make sure that they are active interliners, would need some kind of authorization.


Before we went to Cape Town, each delegate received a message from the RVP, NA asking that each delegate respond with the amount of members in their respective clubs.

To date we have 443 members from 15 clubs I feel it was a good idea to survey this, perhaps we can make room for improvements.

Our Regional Meeting in May 2008 will be held in the exciting city of New York. It is a very new young club, Vancouver had put together a package at the last minute, but felt New York deserves a chance to really get involved in interlining.

North America was very excited at Vancouver's Wine Tour plan for May/08. I have brought home deposits and application forms from 4 interliners, with another 12 telling me they will be coming. It is very exciting.

Then after lunch at a German restaurant, we were taken by ferry to Robben Island for a tour of the prison where Nelson Mandela was imprisoned. Then back to the hotel for dinner and regional night.



Tuesday was meetings for delegates and relaxation or shopping or tours for observers. Dinner and regional night.

Wednesday was meeting for delegates followed by the Gala dinner and dance.

On Thursday a tour of the famous South African Wine Country which included a visit to Stellenbosch and Paarl where we were taken through a farm winery with tasting and shopping for souvenirs. Lunch was at Spier Estates where you could pet a cheetah at the Cheetah Rehabilitation Centre or explore and shop. Back to the hotel for dinner where the highlight was watching the waiters and waitresses up dancing. They enjoyed the music.


Leaving Capetown, we wished we could stay. Our thanks to Africa, Indian Oceans, Middle East region and especially Yousef for a fabulous AGA



Thank you speech prepared but not delivered


Can I have your attention, please.

CAIRO and NILE CRUISE (2)
